Don't nibble at a picturebook! Dust jackets, covers, endpapers, title pages and prologue pictures all belong to the picturebook and contribute to making it a multimodal object, where pictures, words and design integrate into a single organic entity creating a whole greater than all the parts put together. In our ELT classrooms we merely nibble at picturebooks and I'd like us to reconsider this nibbling. Thus, in my plenary I will discuss all those bits of the picturebook we usually ignore; I'll suggest ways we can take bite after bite exploiting every single part, to finish knowing we've made the most of that whole - the picturebook.
